Home Is a Wonderful Place to Be

Don Larsen, 87, has lived in his home near Osakis for the last 22 years. Like many of us, he enjoys the simple things homeownership has to offer: his neighborhood, independence, and the ability to feed and watch birds outside his home. Having grown up on the same land, his home is where he wants to remain, but with a sagging deck and large step in the entrance, it was becoming difficult for Don to manage his walker and safely get in and out of his home.

Don's daughter heard about Habitat's new Aging in Place program and reached out on his behalf. After learning that the scope of work was within the program's services, Don filled out an application and was approved for work to begin.

Led by volunteer **Tom Fleming**, more than 20 volunteers worked for six days to rebuild Don's front deck, his back deck, install a gate near his indoor stairs, and put grab bars in the bathroom. He now has two solid, new decks with "walker-friendly" thresholds, and a greatly reduced risk of falling throughout his home.

Thanks to the Aging in Place program supported by donors and volunteers, Don can be near wildlife and continue his independence – which is exactly where he wants to be.

Vietnam Volunteers Build Homes and Friendships



The 14 volunteers who built homes with Habitat Douglas County in the Dong Thap Province of Vietnam are back home safe, sound, and with full hearts. They were joined by 230 volunteers from around the world to build 21 homes for families living in poverty. Members of the Douglas County team reflected their thoughts throughout the trip via the Habitat website's blog.

Jonathan Reckford, CEO of Habitat for Humanity once stated, *"Habitat for Humanity is all about changing lives: starting with yours and mine."* I think each and every volunteer who spent the week building with families in the Dong Thap province would agree

that the impact isn't only on the family improving their housing situation, but on each of us as well. How we see the

world, poverty, and different cultures are forever changed for the better.

Rose Shorma shared, "We were honored to be able to spend some time visiting with the couple who will be living in the home we are building. They are among the poorest of the poor, yet their eyes and hearts are rich with kindness. The owner's wife, Kinh, was diagnosed with ovarian cancer, so they have many additional expenses for her treatment, as well as the loss of her

income. They sold the little rice paddy area that they owned, so their oldest son could attend the University in Saigon. They realize their only hope out of poverty is through education of their children. As human beings we all yearn to take care of our families by providing the basic needs. They are giving up so much so their children can attend extra schooling. Their son-in-law is also working side by side with us, all day, and late into the evening. What hard working people they are." **Tom Sinning** recapped his experience, "As the week went on, we began to tease and treat each other as special brothers and sisters. Those moments of jokes and laughter were the best balm that could be offered for our sweaty faces and achy muscles.

One day the skies clouded up and a torrential tropical downpour was upon us. While we waited out the storm, we shared stories and compared heights, all the time laughing and binding ourselves to each other with gentleness, humility and patience as we waited for the rain to stop.

What a gift to our connections to have that storm bring us closer to each other. To force us to take the time to laugh and joke to see the joy and kindness reflected in each other's faces. To see the unity of the Spirit in each other's humanity."

"This is my first build with Habitat outside the United States. While the typical choir of hammers maybe absent from the site, it is easy to see that the trowels are singing quite nicely (and joined in harmony with the roosters, chickens and ducks that keep us company) and another successful Habitat build is underway. Community is being built, a family will have a decent place to call home, and our hearts will forever be changed from the sounds coming from the House 10 build site," wrote **Kristen Sand.**



"Coming to Vietnam and being involved in the Big

Build was one of the highlights of my life. We all learned so much about the country and some of its people. We arrived as strangers but left as friends. Some of us worried that we might experence some hostility because of the Vietnam War.

In contrast, we encountered kindness, warmth, friendship, gratitude and even love. I met new friends on the build that love these experiences so much they have participated twice, five times, and one young person who has been on nine Big Builds. It really is a life-changing experience," noted **Dave Anderson**.
