Dear Friends,


On behalf of Habitat for Humanity of Douglas County and the families we serve, I want to express my deepest gratitude for your support of our homeownership and Aging in Place programs. This year, we celebrate Habitat for Humanity of Douglas County's 25th anniversary of bringing people together to build homes, communities and hope. Over these 25 years, we have served over 139 local families through our homeownership, repair programs, and 106 families through our international tithe.

Together, our impact continues to grow. I invite you to join me in reflecting on what we were able to accomplish in the 2021-2022 fiscal year. We reached an affiliate milestone of serving 20 families! Thanks to your support, five local families achieved their dream of homeownership. Through our Aging in Place program, we partnered with 15 homeowners to make affordable repairs to improve safety and accessibility for seniors so they can remain in their home.

Home is much like a quilt

Home is more than a few rooms with doors and windows. A true home is made up of many pieces - often mismatched - but all well-loved and expressive, much like a quilt.

In 2010, Karen (Hildebrandt) Martinson was a single mother of two children, doing her best to provide for her family. Karen shared, "Single parenting is hard. You're often empty – financially, emotionally, and physically. Sometimes you get ill just from the stress."

One day, an "angel" knocked on Karen's door, encouraging her to attend a meeting to learn more about Habitat's affordable homeownership program. That angel said, "I'll watch your kids. You go to the meeting. You are exactly the type of person they work with." Karen took a leap of faith and attended the meeting. By the end of the meeting, Karen completed her application and had all the financial documents ready. A week later, Habitat called and shared they wanted to visit with her more about the program. "When they arrived at my home, they told me I was approved. Within two weeks, my life took a dramatic turn. I had been praying for somewhere to safely live with my young boys." Nine intense months later, Karen became a homeowner. "Having my Habitat home gave me an opportunity to provide stability for my family.

Stability for me as an adult was infused into my children. My home was a safe place. Jesus was everywhere in that house, from the many prayers shared during the build to the thoughtful comments people wrote on the garage walls, a Habitat tradition."

During the home dedication, Habitat homebuyers and their children receive a quilt made by local quilters. Each adult quilt is sewn with a log cabin pattern with a red center to signify the heart of the home. Recipients of the quilts feel the impacts of these gifts, figuratively and literally. "The quilt given to me was so meaningful to me. I used to wrap it around myself when I needed to feel a little extra strength. It gave me so much joy to see it hanging on the wall of my home, allowing me to remember how the community cared about me and my family."

Twelve years later, Karen's Habitat experience has come full circle. Last November, she began volunteering to make the quilt tops that adult homebuyers receive. "I asked God for a way to give back. God gifted me quilting. I had wanted to quilt my entire life and this became my season to use this gift." Karen hopes the quilts will remind each family that people care about and believe in them. "God put people in place to care for you. I hope they feel as much strength and comfort as I did from the quilt given to me."
