Cost of Home

A safe home. Nutritious food. Health care. Access to good schools. Reliable transportation. Which would you choose?

Because of increased housing costs and growing income inequality, nearly one in ten households in Minnesota face cost burdens, with housing requiring either 30 percent of their income (costburdened) or 50 percent (severely cost-burdened). These burdens leave more than 38 million households with little income to afford the cost of food, health care and other basic necessities. In fact, "cost-burdened households with children spend on average \$190 less on food and 70 percent less on health care when compared with similar households living in affordable housing," according to the *State of the Nation's Housing 2018, Joint Center for Housing Studies, 2018.*

With nearly 19 million severely cost-burdened households in the U.S., advocating for affordable housing for homeowners and renters is as important as ever. Habitat Douglas County is working with Habitat for Humanity International to establish, strengthen, and grow housing programs at the local, state and federal level to increase and preserve affordable housing options for low and moderate income renters and homeowners. Cardinal Build Update

In October, Habitat announced a new partnership with Alexandria Area High School called the Cardinal Build. Senior students in the EMTNR Academy CAPS class have been spending their class time helping build the home at 1118 Irving Street, Alexandria.

The students – Ben Olson, Preston Johnson and Domanik Hines – have been able to participate in almost every aspect of the build, from laying out the materials during pre-build to raising walls, setting roof trusses, shingling, installing windows and sheet rocking.

When asked about their favorite tasks so far, the three unanimously said they've "had fun seeing the house coming together. It's awesome to work with Randy and the crew. It's amazing how fast the house has come together."

Our subcontractors and the building inspectors have even taken time to demonstrate and explain their craft so the students can have exposure to as much as possible. We are grateful for this partnership and the hard work the students have contributed to this home. Not only are the students learning about construction trades through hand-on experiences, they are also learning the enjoyment of serving others and working directly with the homebuyer, Mary. Local Volunteers Participated in International Build in Mexico







This fall, Habitat Douglas County sent three volunteers to participate on a Habitat International trip to Chiapas, Mexico from October 22-25. This build was in honor of Habitat Mexico's 30th anniversary.

Team members included Tom Sinning (Team Leader), Catherine Scholer-Kliewer and Debbie Hubner. Tom shared a few highlights about the trip:

- Since 1994, Habitat Mexico has provided 48,000 housing solutions, serving 1,700 families in Chiapas alone.
- In Chiapas, nearly 94% of the population lives with some form of poverty and 10 different languages are spoken. 82% of families are indigenous.
- Some of the most important solutions Habitat has helped provide include building masonry stoves which get rid of dangerous indoor pollution and are much more efficient at cooking and providing a heat source in the winter.
- The small community where the group worked is located about 45 minutes from the city with half of the way only gravel and dirt trails. It is located at about 8000-ft. elevation.
- The group's primary jobs were hauling 30-pound blocks, filling masonry joints, and moving the large piles of wet dirt from the workspace to fill the foundation in the rear rooms. They had to work hard between all the rain.
- Veronica, the homebuyer, made lunch for the volunteers of homemade chicken soup, tortillas, quesadillas, pineapple drink, and spicy tasty salsa. Her husband and son are in the US working to earn money for purchasing the home.
- Training for the Habitat families takes up to eight months and includes budgeting finances, healthy living, taking care of a home and a number of other areas.
- Habitat has helped 74 families in this community since 2004. It is making such a huge impact!



Organics Recycling Drop-Off Site



Habitat for Humanity of Douglas County has partnered with Pope/Douglas Solid Waste Management to provide a drop-off site for organics recycling.

According to Pope/Douglas Solid Waste Management, "Organics (food scraps and soiled papers) make up approximately 38% of what is still in the garbage – even after strong single sort recycling programs. Organics Recycling is an important part of effective waste management programs. Items are returned back to nature through commercial composting – reducing resource use and greenhouse gas emissions. Organics Recycling also reduces demand and wear and tear on local garbage processing facilities – such as Pope/Douglas' Material Recycling and Waste to Energy Facilities."
